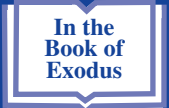

Moses is the central figure in the book of Exodus. Exodus means 'departure' and as we continue with studies in this book, we shall see why it has been given this name. Moses' parents were both Hebrews (Israelites) from the family or tribe of Levi. Levi was one of the twelve sons of Jacob. Jacob had been named Israel by God.

As the story unfolds, it is obvious that God’s hand was on Moses’ life. Miriam, Moses’ older sister, must have been very worried when the princess discovered her baby brother in his basket. When she realized that Pharaoh’s daughter was not going to throw him straight into the Nile, she quickly came out of hiding and offered to fetch one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for her.

When Moses was old enough, he was taken to the palace and brought up as Pharaoh’s grandson and was also educated in all the wisdom of the Egyptians. (See Acts 7: 22.) However, we can be sure that his ‘nurse’ had already taught him about his own people, the Hebrews, and their God - the one true God. At the age of forty, Moses decided to visit his fellow Israelites. He was enraged when he saw one of the Hebrews being beaten by an Egyptian.

Unfortunately, the next day he discovered that people knew about what he had done. Sometimes we do things we know are wrong and we think that no one will know about them. These things have a habit of somehow slipping out into the open, often at the worst possible moment! However, even if we escape detection by others, it doesn’t mean our actions go unnoticed by God!

God had obviously revealed to Moses that He had chosen him to rescue the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt. But Moses took matters into his own hands and in so doing committed a great sin. However, God still had His hand on Moses’ life, even though Moses may not have been aware of it. Pharaoh heard about what Moses had done and planned to kill him, so he fled from Egypt.

Moses probably thought he would never be any help to God’s people now - but not so! God’s plan was coming together. The Israelites prayed and God heard their prayer. God intended to keep His promise to free them and lead them to their own land.

God’s promises to us never fail either. We can rely on them. God wants to free us from slavery to sin and take us to Heaven. Trust Him to do it for you.

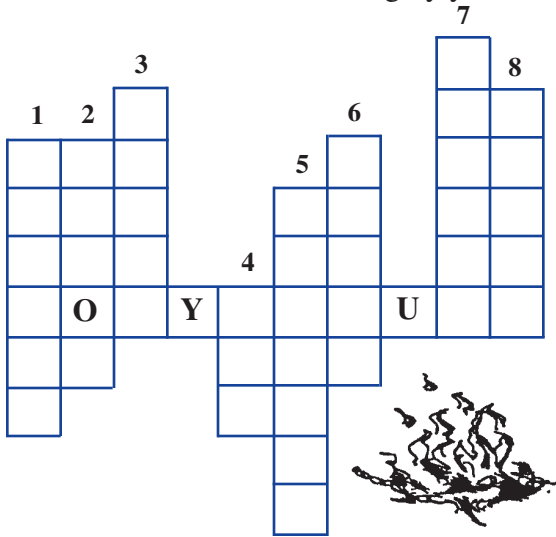

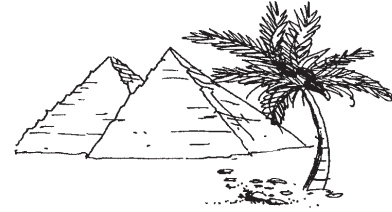

More plagues followed this one. Sometimes Pharaoh acknowledged his sin and agreed to let the Israelites go. He would ask Moses to intercede with his God to end that particular plague. However, as soon as the plague was over, he went back on his word. Sadly, many people still treat God in this way. They call on Him when they are in trouble and need His help, but forget about Him when everything is going all right.

This tenth and final plague (punishment) described in the Bible Reading was the worst and the most devastating of them all - for the Egyptians. But for the Israelites, who did exactly what God told them to do, it was the means of deliverance from slavery and the start of their journey to the Promised Land. For us, today, it can have tremendous significance too, because God designed it to be a picture of what the Lord Jesus Christ would do for us.

So we see that the Lord Jesus Christ is described as the Lamb, and as our Passover and Sacrifice. Just as the Passover lamb had to be without blemish or defect, so the Lord Jesus was without sin. The lamb was killed. Its life was taken and its blood was put on the door frame of each Israelite home. God promised to protect every such home from the angel of judgment. In the same way, Christ sacrificed His life on the cross and His blood was poured out. We need to apply this to our lives by personally trusting Him for salvation. God promises to protect from judgment all those who have trusted Christ for salvation.
